Pottery/Ceramicist

Ceramicists use a number of methods to create items ranging from culinary and household items to sculptural and decorative objects employing a variety of techniques in their work. I order to create an object they may:

- Use hand-building techniques
- Throw or mould softened clay, while rotating it on a wheel. This is the traditional method of making vessels including cups and bowls
- Make flat goods such as plates using a process called jiggering. It can be carried out by hand, but is often partly or fully automated. A flat piece of clay is placed on to a rotating mould and a metal profile or pattern is pushed down to squash the clay into the required shape
- · Make hollow items such as cups, by hand or by machine using a process called jolleying
- Cast an object, which involves pouring liquid clay (or 'slip') into moulds to form items such as bowls, or sections of products such as teapots. They are then joined together using the liquid clay as an adhesive
- · Finish an item, by turning and shaping on a lathe, using either hand tools, semi-automatic or automatic processes.
- Firing and glazing

Skills

Key skills for a ceramicist include:

- · creative flair and practical ceramics skills
- time management and the ability to work to deadlines
- · excellent communication skills
- organisational ability
- attention to detail
- photography, computer software and design skills
- business management skills
- · a good understanding of health and safety procedures

Qualifications

Many ceramicists will have studied an art or design degree in an areas such as applied arts or design, ceramics, or 3D design.

A postgraduate qualification is not essential, but studying for a Masters level qualification in ceramic design might help you to hone practical skills and prepare for professional life.

A variety of part-time courses are available in further and adult education institutes, providing the opportunity to develop ceramics skills.

Career Progression

How your career develops will depend on your specialism.

You might want to be self-employed and concentrate on the design and production of your own ceramic products. If you opt for self-employment, career development will come by building your reputation through exhibition success and your visibility through networking, writing articles and giving talks about your work and techniques.

Alternatively, you could be employed in a larger company. Here, career progression comes from working with production teams, liaising with external clients and seizing opportunities to be innovative. There may be opportunities in research departments or for promotion to managing teams of designers within the studio. Increased responsibility will inevitably bring an increase in non design-related tasks. Another potential route is in academia. With further study, it's possible to work in higher education as a lecturer in ceramics.

Ceramicists often develop a portfolio career. Combining varied roles may spark creative ideas and keep you motivated. Ceramicists often combine their creative practice with:

A Level 1 Introduction to Hair and Beauty is an introductory courses designed to give you an overview of Hair and Beauty as a profession that will enable you to work in the industry either as an employees or as a sindependent trader.

Level 2 Beauty Therapy Services gives you the opportunity to realise your ambitions to become a beauty therapist or beauty consultant, or if your goal is to work in the hair and beauty industry in general. Learning a variety of key skills such as hair removal techniques, manicures and pedicures, and facial skincare, you will gain the practical and technical knowledge needed to be a success in the exciting world of beauty therapy. As well as developing your beauty treatment knowledge, skills, and techniques, you will learn about customer care, reception duties, health and safety, and recommending products to your customers, to fully prepare you for life in the beauty industry.

Level 2 Diploma in Nail Technology, is for those who want to develop skills an possibly their own independent business, in a very niche market of Beauty treatments, as as a fully qualified nail technician. This practical, theory-based course will allow you to gain expertise in key areas such as providing manicures and pedicures, applying and maintaining nail enhancements of all types, maintaining personal health and well-being, health and safety, and client care. You will also be able to demonstrate your creative skills, whilst acquiring all the required elements to thrive in the beauty industry, either in a Beauty salon or as a freelance nail technician.

The Level 3 Diploma in Beauty Therapy is an advanced, varied, and hugely interesting qualification where you will learn how to develop the skills to deliver a range of beauty techniques from Indian head and stone body massage, right through to electro-therapy treatments. This course also covers the more familiar aspects of beauty therapy, but takes you to the next level, teaching you the workings of intimate waxing for both men and women, and how to perform electrical epilation. Studying the Level 3 Diploma in Beauty Therapy will also develop your knowledge of salon life and the beauty industry as a whole, including monitoring and maintaining health and safety practices, promotion and selling products and services, and being adept at improve client care and communication.

Your accounting or bookkeeping course can lead to many different career paths. For some it will be necessary to embark on further study.

Accountants perform account analysis, review financial statements, documents, and other reports to ensure they are accurate, conduct routine and annual audits, review financial operations, prepare tax returns, advise on areas that require more efficiencies and cost-savings, and provide risk analysis and forecasting.

Bookkeepers manage a company's financial accounts, ensuring they are accurate and easy to review. Their work plays an important role in the operation of a successful business, which can have very many transactions in a single day, let alone a week, month, fiscal quarter, or year

The <u>fashion industry contributed as much as £32.3 billion to the UK economy in 2017</u> according to data published by the British Fashion Council. This exciting industry is growing rapidly and continues to be a major UK employer, meaning that talented fashion designers are very much in demand.

Consumers are also becoming increasingly aware of the environmental impact of fashion and there is mounting pressure on the industry to prioritise sustainable materials, fabrics and working practices. Skilled fashion designers with an eye for detail and an interest in the issues facing the industry are now needed more than ever before.

Technologist

Technician

Textile technicians make sure the machines and equipment that are used to produce textiles in factories are operating correctly, minimising interruption in production and ensuring operatives can work safely. Some textile technicians work in the production process, e.g. as a weaver or spinner, as well as undertaking routine maintenance of machines.

Fashion designers use their advanced technical skills and creativity to develop new women's, men's, and children's apparel. Drawing inspiration from current fashion trends and consumer needs, they will sketch out ideas and decide on the fabrics, colours and patterns that shape a garment. They will often have a specific brief to work towards and may specialise in a particular kind of clothing, such as sportswear or formalwear. £29,000 - £35,000

Textile Print Designer

Textile designers create designs for woven, knitted or printed fabrics. These can be used for furnishings, clothing, packaging and floor and wall coverings. Textile designers have to research trends and forecasts in the textile industry. £28,000 - £35,000

Pottern Cutter

Pattern cutters create pattern templates based on drawings from a fashion designer to make clothes.
